Ever wonder where the term "whole nine yards" came from?

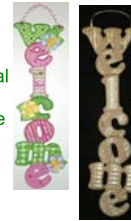
I'm sew glad you asked. lol

This project can be done in 4" hoops (each letter is a separate applique) or make it faster by putting several letters on a large hoop. Bring your machine, hoop, and threads. Sewing Tip

I've been sewing more years than I care to say. But when staff, friends and family say I know everything about sewing I always tell them there is always more to learn. Well, I recently learned something that maybe everyone else knew already, but it was like an "I could of had a V8" moment for me when I read it.

Full skirts are always a challenge when turning up the hem. I was taught like everyone I know to make little darts/pleats every so often to accommodate the fullness. BUT this tip makes sew much more sense I don't know why I didn't think of it before. Simply baste around the bottom edge and pull the thread slightly to ease the extra in and *Voila* no more darts/pleats to be had. I've been using this technique to round corners on patch pockets and various other projects but never thought to do a hem. Geez that's brilliant.

Like I said, you may have already known this tip but we all can learn more and from each other. Sew if you have a tip that gave you an *aha moment* send it in so it can be shared with everyone.
